Class Philosophy:

Welcome to Mrs. Barbulesco-Lamb's English class! I look forward to sharing with you my love for reading and analyzing literature, poetry, and dramatic plays as well as assisting you in improving your skills in writing and oral expression. Being able to communicate clearly and in a manner appropriate to your receiving audience is a life skill that every person needs in order to be successful, no matter what your career choice. An aspect of improving communication skills is the building of vocabulary as well as an understanding of etymology (the origin of a word) and how to properly use words in context. One also cannot be an excellent communicator without the ability to understand and reflect upon information received. Much emphasis will be placed in our class on learning what it means to read and listen actively as well as how to ingest, summarize, and analyze information, hopefully before formulating an opinion. I hope that my class will be relevant to your personal goals as a learner, and I encourage you to help guide our class in a direction that will best serve every individual in the room. Discussion and writing is a large component of our class, and I expect each of you to use both tools to share your unique perspective.

Expectations:

I expect that you will come to my class each day ready to learn. I make the effort to be on time to my class every day and to have all of the necessary supplies as well as the right mindset to be your teacher. If, for some reason, I am late, unprepared, or not 100% focused (which is very rare, but I am human too), I will always hold myself accountable and put my best foot forward to give you 200% to make up for the fact that I failed at being prepared. I will hold each of you to the same standard that I do myself. You are expected to be on time to my class, to have your needed supplies and homework that is due, and to have an attitude that promotes your learning and the learning of those around you. When you do not meet these standards, I expect you to hold yourself responsible for your own actions, not to attempt to shift blame onto other people or things. I am all for positive reinforcement, and you will see that the more you invest in doing your best in my class, the more I will invest in finding extras to make our learning more exciting. These bonuses can be anything from exciting projects to field trips to resources to guest speakers.

Journal Entry Rules:

1. the room must be silent (you can listen to music in earbuds unless you've lost this privilege)
2. 5 minutes of writing
3. neat handwriting
4. correct spelling, grammar, and punctuation
5. content must be something you are okay sharing with the class

Late Work:*Large Projects/Essays/Presentations*

It is imperative for your success and progression in the class that you turn your work in on time, especially these large assignments; however, if you do turn in one of them late, you will lose a 1/3 of a grade (3% off) for each day it is late. The latest day that I will take one of these assignments is one week after it is due.

For example, if an assignment is due on a Tuesday, the following reductions would happen each day it was late:

3% off on Weds	6% off on Thurs	9% off on Fri	12% off on Sat
15% off on Sun	18% off on Mon	21% off on the following Tues	

(Last day the assignment will be accepted)

Daily Classwork, Responses, Discussions, etc.

For C and I Group as well as the first two weeks a student is in A group, daily assignments can be turned in late for 1pt or 10% off (whichever is greater) if they are given to me the day after they are due. Students who are in A group must turn in their work by the end of the day it is due for them to receive the 1pt or 10% off penalty. However, students who are repeatedly late with turning in their work may lose this privilege. Depending on the circumstances, I may allow you to turn assignments in even later for 50% off but that is up to my discretion and will not be allowed on a regular basis.

Excused absences are a separate circumstance and all work will be counted on time if turned in by the indicated make up work due date.
